

The Reframing of Micro vs. Macro

As professionals, we concern ourselves with individuals, families, groups, and communities, and we work hard to enhance their social functioning and overall well-being. However, to successfully accomplish these goals, it is vital that we understand trauma in all its forms, as well as the long-lasting effects. Most importantly, as social workers, we must be aware of our own experience with trauma and how it might be awakened when providing support to others.

This interactive session is designed to encourage social workers to explore their understanding of trauma and identify ways to effectively work with individuals whose lives have been interrupted by trauma. We will examine how traumas, like intergenerational and historical trauma, present in some communities, and together we will address the challenges social workers face when trying to establish trust with individuals affected by trauma.

FULFILL IN-PERSON LICENSURE REQUIREMENTS WITH CULTURAL COMPETENCY AND ETHICS CEUS

The 2017–2019 licensure cycle requires LSWs and LCSWs to obtain a minimum of thirty CEUs, with a minimum of three hours in ethics and three hours in cultural competency. Additionally 50 percent of those CEUs must also be obtained through face-to-face, in-person instruction. This year's conference is offering up to 20 in-person CEUs with as many as 12 hours in ethics and 23 hours in cultural competency.

Many programs exist that work to prevent and intervene with community violence. However, many practitioners are concerned that interventions have little longterm impact as program participants return to stressful environments. This interactive workshop will explore the utilization of place-based design in an effort to address systemic violence. Reviewing multi-partner efforts to address vulnerable communities, the presenter will offer how hyper-local approaches, highlighting how history, culture, and structural forces create the conditions for interpersonal violence and intervention designed. WHAT DO I NEED TO RENEW MY LICENSE?

Every licensed social worker in the state of Illinois is required to accumulate a total of 30 continuing education units (CEUs) during the current licensure cycle. Of those 30 CEUs, three (3) hours must be in ethics and another three (3) hours must be in cultural competency. You can have more than three hours of each (i.e., 6 ethics hours of the 30 required), but you must obtain the minimum of three hours in each.

NOTE: No CEUs are required for the remainder of the first two-year licensure cycle in which you are licensed. This means you are not required to acquire CEUs the first time you renew your license, but you are still required to submit (and pay) the renewal application and fee.

HOW MANY OF MY CEU HOURS NEED TO BE IN-PERSON?

It is now a requirement for licensed social workers (LSWs) and licensed clinical social workers (LCSWs) must obtain a minimum of 50% of the total continuing education (CE) hours required must be obtained by a method that includes face-to-face, in-person instruction or experience. This means that at least 15 of the 30 CEUs required for licensure renewal must be earned via face-to-face, in-person trainings.

NOTE: According to IDFPR, live-virtual workshops (trainings wherein the speaker is not in the same room as the attendee) do not qualify as face-to-face, in-person instruction.

HOW DO YOU EARN CEUS?

That's easy! The NASW-Illinois Chapter is a licensed provider of continuing education units (CEUs). It is our goal to make it as easy as possible for you to obtain your CEUs by providing workshops and webinars throughout the state at your convenience. The percentage of dues deductible each year is published on socialworkers.org in Member FAQs and in *Social Work Advocates* in February/March. Contributions to the NASW Foundation and its supported activities are generally tax deductible as charitable contributions. Consult a tax advisor regarding issues of tax deductibility. Contributions to PACE, NASW's political action committee are not tax deductible and can only be accepted from individual members and not businesses, organizations, or government agencies.

Full payment is required to activate your membership. Your application will be processed within two weeks upon receipt. NASW reserves the right to determine membership in keeping with Association principles and policies.

Refunds: Membership cancellations/refunds must be requested in writing within 30 days of membership activation. A \$25 processing fee will be applied to refunds of membership dues. **Returned Check Fee:** A \$35 processing fee will be assessed for returned checks.

Replacement Card: You may request a replacement for your NASW membership ID card through Member Services for \$15, or print a free copy of your membership card and certificate at socialworkers.org/naswmembercenter.
